A note from the Editor

In this issue we have included in the centre pages a map compiled by Judith Harper showing the village as it was 80 to 100 years ago covering the period when Maureen Audsley was growing up in the village. Much of the information about the village at that time has been provided by Sybil Goodson, Gordon Allison and Wendy Hilliard who we thank for their contributions. Although the village has seen significant changes it is apparent that it has been much less affected by growth and urban development than many other towns and villages in Buckinghamshire. This must be the result to a large measure of the creation of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty in 1965 and also the planning policies of Wycombe District Council which have helped to protect the local environment.

It is interesting in this context that in 1801 Ellesborough had 480 inhabitants in 91 families living in 90 houses; by 1901, after a peak of 782 in 1851, the parish had 577 inhabitants. We now have rather more houses but the population is now estimated at no more than 820, which helps to confirm the slow rate of growth over the past 100 years.

This edition also includes an appeal for contributions to help pay for the refurbishment of Ellesborough Parish Hall, which is an important village amenity and now needs a comprehensive refurbishment. One way in which residents can help provide the funds for this work is to become members of the 200 Club, details of which are included in the body of the magazine.

Maureen Audsley 1921 – 2018

Maureen was at the centre of village life for the majority of her 97 years and her death on 30th November is much mourned by her children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and by many who benefitted from her distinctive contribution to a thriving village community.

Maureen attended Ellesborough school and it is no surprise that she was considered a star pupil. However, educational opportunities were limited in those days and at 14 she left school one Friday and on the following Monday went into service as a scullery maid with a family she didn't know.

By the time she was 28 she had five children: the 'five Js' (June, Jackie, Jo, John and Janice) who she brought up mainly on her own, at 3 Beacon View. Those were the days of no central heating, no running hot water, outside lavatories and a dependency on vegetables from the garden. However, her son John remembers those days as being mainly idyllic with the children taking full advantage of the local countryside and grateful for the support of the wider family.

In 1961 Maureen moved to Yorkshire but after four years there she returned to this area, initially to Belmore where she helped look after the Bartman family, and then to her beloved cottage in Terrick. She was particularly fond of her garden and delighted in sending visitors away with bunches of flowers. In her last year she ensured that her cottage plants found good homes with friends and family.

To the community of Ellesborough and Butlers Cross Maureen was legendary. She was tireless in her charitable work and together with her friends played a key role organising a team of kitchen staff for the Silver Jubilee celebrations. She was still in harness during the Golden Jubilee events and in 2012, dressed perfectly in red, white and blue, enjoyed judging the best Ruby Jubilee crown.

Maureen was a long-standing member of the Parish Council and for decades was Chair of the Village Hall. Until her last few years she played a key role in almost all village fund raising activities, especially for the renovations, upkeep and maintenance of the hall. It is a fitting tribute to her achievements that the committee room is named in her honour.

The most significant contribution that Maureen made to the wider community was as a member of the Royal British Legion. She was a member of the Ellesborough Royal British Legion (Women's Section) for 65 years and its Chair for nearly 50 years. Her ability to represent and to lead was recognised by her appointment as Chair of the Bucks Royal British Legion (Women's Section) for many years. As a long standing friend said, "When our family moved to Butlers Cross we joked that 'the Legion ran the village' but on reflection it was Maureen's energetic way of involving and welcoming people that caused the community to come together for social and national events".

Maureen will be much missed by many but especially by her five children, eight grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren and two great-grandsons.

Lindengate Welcomes Spring

Regular Ellesborough Magazine readers will know that we have been supporting and providing information about Lindengate Garden, the mental health Charity based next to the World's End Garden Centre, since it began five years ago. We're back this edition for an update.



Still busy in wintertime, Lindengate Gardeners (our term for service users) are planting and tending the seedlings that will be this summer's glorious blooms – on a sunny morning there's more than an inkling that spring is on the way – sweet peas, salad crops, onions and herbs, all well on the way and basking in a little winter sunshine which goes a long way in a cosy polytunnel.

We've also created some new planters using the simple method of piling the flints up in a natural and uncemented shape, great for wildlife as well as creating a beautiful and informal cottage garden look. We're planning to showcase a range of native wildflowers in them so it's going to be an exciting and informative project as well as a treat for the senses.

The conservation projects continue, with the Black Poplars developing into beautiful mature trees that can be planted out in Aylesbury Vale, one of the last areas where they are found in the wild. Meanwhile the Devil's Bit Scabious plants grown at Lindengate are sustaining butterfly populations at various sites in the region.

Like the natural world in spring, Lindengate is changing. A new Director, Jan Webster, has been appointed to lead the organisation into a new phase. Jan has over twenty years'



experience in supporting organisations with leadership, planning, evaluation and fundraising, operating in some of the poorest communities in Africa, within challenging environments. She is excited about her first spring and summer at Lindengate.

Plans are already underway for this year's events too; our annual summer event, the Lindengate Fair, will be on the afternoon of 8th June with our usual array of garden plants grown on the site; live music; local artisan stalls; lunches and teas on the lawn; and visiting donkeys and farm animals. A much-loved day-out and a chance for the Lindengate family of volunteers and Gardeners to all be together on the same day.

But maybe that's a long time to wait if you really want to know more about the work that goes on at Lindengate, helping people through mental health issues and supporting conservation work in the wider area too. So why not come along to a Lindengate Drop-In Session? We welcome visitors any time between 10am and 12 noon at these sessions and the next ones are on Saturday 16th March and Saturday 13th April. You can book or just turn up, as you please. We will be there waiting to show you round and give you a flavour of what we do and how we help people and nature all at the same time.

Gardening in Ellesborough Notes from an occasional diary



Can it really be that spring has finally begun? That winter has gone, taking with it snow and ice? Will we have a decent spell of reasonable weather? Remember last year when winter merged with spring and went on well through March into April? Certainly the sun is gaining strength, though there is always the possibility of floods of rain and gale force winds even snow before Easter.

In any event, now is the time when optimism, the gardener's default trait, predominates. It is that wonderful time of year when we visualise the best possible outcome to all our projects and planting plans. Some will be a success, no doubt quite a few will fall short of the perfection we strive for. Nevertheless we plough on with our dreams; without them nothing worthwhile gets done. And sometimes, through experience, research and with a fair measure of hard work and good fortune, it turns out surprisingly well.


Just back from a winter break in the warmth of the West Indies, on a fine sunny day we surveyed the garden in mid- February; it was a mixture of end of winter desolation lit up by large, brilliant white swathes of snowdrops, some patches of aconites slowly expanding over the years, early narcissi reflecting in the pond and yellow crocus in the little meadow. The winter flowering clematis on the west facing wall had come into flower in early January and even then was attracting the first intrepid bees and is still going strong despite the sub-zero conditions of early February.

Meanwhile the perfumed viburnum *bodnantense* has finished flowering and before long the role of filling the air with scent will be taken up by the winter flowering honeysuckle lonicera *fragantissima*.

The Head Gardener (HG) and Anne set to with an assault on all the cutting back of herbaceous plant material which had been left for effect and for the benefit of the birds through the winter months. I will be starting on spring pruning of roses, digging out a deceased flowing currant to be burnt. Earlier the blades on the shredder were sharpened and with large amount of cutting back of ivy and other material is going to be put to a lot work. Some of the patches of lawn that suffered from the drought last summer will need seeding. We have accumulated a substantial amount of homemade compost that needs to be spread good and deep on most of the borders, so necessary on our thin soil. We may need to import more to complete the spring cover up that also retains moisture in the soil and suppresses weeds.

If past summers are anything to go by, we anticipate a full spring and summer of garden activity. We support the National Garden Scheme (NGS) which raise considerable funds for charities and although nowadays limiting our openings to groups and individuals by appointment some dates are being secured already. The HG thoroughly enjoys having visitors and our challenge is to find time to fit in visits to other gardens as well as getting to some Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) shows. Great claims are made for the health benefits of gardening both physical and emotional and getting out for a few hours every week, whatever the weather, is becoming a major theme promoted by the NGS and RHS. We are certainly getting plenty of that and in the warmth of the greenhouse the HG spends hours propagating seeds and cuttings even when it is raining.

Happy New Year!

It was a delight to welcome the children back at the start of term. A big thank you to all the families who attended our Christmas Fayre in early December. I am delighted to inform you that we raised just over £1284 for the school! This would not have been possible without the fantastic organisation by parents and the Friends of Kimble team, who kindly volunteered their time to ensure the Fayre ran smoothly. Without our wonderful volunteers we would not be able to put on such fantastic events, so thank you to all involved.

Maths Morning and Workshop

The first week of 2019 began with the whole school maths morning. It was a great chance to get the children's mathematical brains into gear in a fun and collaborative way. The children enjoyed working in their mixed age groups to complete challenges that developed their problem solving, reasoning and team work skills further. At the end of the morning, the whole school gathered together and discussed what they had learned, expressing opinions about the different activities and reflecting on what they had enjoyed the most and why. We also invited parents into school for a maths morning instead of our usual parent evening workshop. This proved to be really popular and provided parents with an understanding of how we teach maths in school. It was a very positive event and we are now planning several parent drop-in sessions for phonics so parents can gain an understanding of how we teach phonics in school. Christian Values

MY VISIT TO INDIA

I have just returned from a lovely trip to India. A friend of mine, Jacques, who I met whilst farming in Saudi Arabia is setting up a large dairy project in the state of Tamil Nadu which is the most southerly state in India with a population of about 80,0000 people. I first flew to Bangalore, one of the IT capitals in India, and a nine hour drive from the farm. Much of the infrastructure of the farm is now complete and we spent some of our time procuring cows, which meant visiting small villages and buying them one at a time. This is because there are severe restrictions in India on importing livestock, so stocking the farm is a slow process.

Whereas much of Bangalore is very modern and wealthy, the villages are of course completely different. These villagers are self-sufficient in nearly everything. The houses are small, built of concrete or wood or corrugated, with no glass windows and no furniture. Everything is done outside except for sleeping, where they sleep on the floor. Each has a small plot and any land that can be cultivated – with a little old tractor or other implement – is used for growing rice, vegetables, pineapples, grapes, potatoes, pulses. Most have a cow, or there are a few buffalo or goats and chickens. The animals graze the roadside verges and nowhere is not used. They take their cows to a communal milking parlour, take home what they need and the rest goes into a tank and is sold.

The roads are in use for threshing their rice, which is carted by motor bike or tractor, threshed by hand with a flail and then the process is finished by vehicles driving over the rice. Then the seeds are gathered and the stems saved to feed the livestock, so nothing is wasted. It doesn't matter that the livestock have excreted on the road as an army of insects is always on hand to clean it up, and it looks as though the road has been swept.

Europeans in these areas are rare so Jacques and I were objects of great interest.

Another cottage industry the villager have is silk production. The silk worms are kept in the yards beside their houses in basket like holders. When the silk is ready to process it is done by the women in a communal shed. It is spun into spools and then marketed for weaving.

The dairy project Jacques is developing lies between two ranges of hills and the ground is level and fertile, growing maize for the cows. It is subject to flooding in the monsoon period and as much water as possible is gathered into lagoons which helps during the dry periods, together with ground water pumped from wells. There are to be 900 milking cows eventually, housed under three sheds and under cover. They all have to be tested for Brucellosis and TB and foot and mouth etc. The basis of their food is maize plus concentrates bought in. At the moment there is one resident vet. but when the project is complete there will be three.

The workforce numbers about 40. There is a canteen and my diet consisted of a pot of vegetables and pulses three times a day, with chapattis. Consequently my blood sugars (and I am diabetic) went down and I felt very healthy, but on arriving home I had sausages for supper, so I soon had transgressed.

Another lovely aspect of the farm is the prolific bird life. Kingfishers sit on the telegraph poles and fish in the lagoons for frogs. Many other different birds which I cannot name sit and fly among the teak trees.

My visit coincided with the ancient Hindu festival of Pongal, which means "spilling over". This is a four day festival celebrating the harvest. Houses are cleaned, painted and decorated and new clothes worn. The first rice of the season is boiled until it spills over. The cows too are decorated with garlands and their horns oiled and painted and they are fed special food. The people cook special festive food and visit friends and relatives as we do at Christmas, and traditionally it is the wedding season as it is the season of plenty.

I really enjoyed my trip to India and I am very grateful to Jacques for giving me the opportunity.



I went to Saudi Arabia in 1987 and farmed 2500 hectares in the desert, using wells and pivots. We grew (with the help of my workforce) alfalfa, wheat, rhodes grass, grapes, dates and melons and provided other farms including Jacques', with fodder for their stock; also the King's farm near Riyadh. I was there for fifteen years.










BUTLERS CROSS - our village almost 100 years ago.

2	FORGE GARAGE	Eldridge Blacksmith Forge and Shop.
3	PLOUGH	After being a pub – it becomes a private house.
4	ROYAL MEAD	5 acres of allotments – bought for £300 from C.Rothchild in 1922. Royal Mead housing built in 1936 for needs of working class 3/- to7/6d (15/37p) wk. rent .
5	CHALKSHIRE COT.	Springfield farm workers cottages. Later condemned, sold off privately and named Chalkshire. The Baptist Chapel was situated on the south end of these cottages.
	FARMS	Chalkshire Farm. Springfield Farm and Springfield Cottages (later Chalkshire Cottages) Malt House Farm Dairy and milk delivery. Home Close Farm – as a boy, Gordon Allison brought in the Jersey dairy herd by candle light and paid 1/- (5p) a time. Coombe Farm (Chequers Estate) leased for a Club House and 9 hole Golf Course in 1906/20
6	SMITHS ROW Chalkshire Rd	Sybil Goodson's home – her father bought all 3 cottages at auction for £420 in the late 1940s. He was a bricklayer involved in the rebuilding of bombed London and development of Elm Close in 1937.
7	SOUTHFIELD COTTAGES	Named and owned by Southfield House (Barn House). No sanitation & overcrowded with a family of 8 in 3 rooms. By 1950s - classed as unfit for habitation. Mains Water was completely connected by 1960s – previously water was from rainwater tanks and wells. Imagine Monday wash day!!
8	DUNROBIN	Yew House. Miss Power- her 2 cleaners were sisters called Ms Nickers!
9	BAKEHOUSE	The bakery – delivering oven baked bread and tea by horse and cart.
	51.5515.65.5511.15	Villagers could take their own cakes there to be baked. The Mill/miller was at Bushey Leys.
10	ELDRIDGE DRIVE	A Paddock for the bakery's horse.
10	RUSSELL ARMS	Public House.
11	ELLESBORO' RD to WENDOVER	Rose and Crown Ale House and cottages were opposite Southfield/Barn House. Selling ale but villagers could buy their vinegar on tap here too!
12	BARN HOUSE	Then Southfield House. The village tuck shop was from the barn.
		Mr Cox from Southfield House was a motor agent and also fitted new tyres to prams.
		The District Nurse at Nurses Cottage. Chequers PM Chauffer at Wood Cottage.
13	GUIDE HUT	Village School until 1969. Children walked to school.
14	ELLESBOROUGH GOLF COURSE	Chequers Estate leased part of Coombe Farm for a 9 hole golf course at a rent of 1/- (5p) yr for 42 yrs from 1920. It cost £150 to lay out the 9 hole course. The Golf Club bought this land in 1960. The golf club was extended in 1930 from land at Malt House Farm.
15	VILLAGE HALL	The site was donated from Lord Astley of Chequers in 1903. A focal point in the village with 2 dances per week. The Silver band disbanded in 1930 but reformed in 1938.
16	PLAYGROUND	3 acres of land, west of the hall, was leased from Chequers for a sports field until 1940. The acre behind the hall was leased in 1946 and gifted in 1979. Children also played on Church hill and made dens up on Beacon Hill.
17	POST OFFICE	Post office and shop.
18	LYNDON	Sweet shop & newsagent where villagers could also charge their batteries. To its west side was a coach house to Butlers Cross House.
19	BEACON VIEW	3 blocks of Council Housing with large gardens to address shortfall in housing and encourage food production after World War 1.
20	SPRINGS CLOSE	The Rectory was on the site of Springs Close until 1928
21	THE MANOR	A private house and later for retired clergy. Hosts village fetes and tennis courts.
	CHALKSHIRE RD	A gravel road without footpaths. Many more trees and much less housing. The sight of a motor car created much excitement but complaints were made: "the reckless manner in which Butlers Cross is traversed by motor cars". In 1987 was a 40mph limit was imposed!

The prime season for rhubarb is from April to June, although it may be ready to pick from as early as mid-spring and throughout the summer. It is rich in Vitamin C and fibre. The orange and ginger, used in this recipe, both compliment the rhubarb - although you could use cinnamon, cardamom or nutmeg as alternative spices. As a variation to the shortbread base, try short crust pastry.

INGREDIENTS:

BASE:

150g butter chilled 175g plain flour 50g icing sugar 1 rounded desert spoon ground ginger

FILLING:

700g Rhubarb trimmed & cut into 2 - 3 cm pieces

1 orange - grated rind & juice

50 -75g sugar (or maple syrup for a slightly nutty flavour with more depth)

MERINGUE TOPPING:

4 egg whites 225g caster sugar

METHOD:

- 1. Mix the base ingredients by rubbing in, until they resemble bread crumbs.
- 2. Press lightly over the sides & bottom of a flan dish (23cm diameter) or bring the breadcrumbs together into a ball to press into the tin. (You could just use short crust pastry, if preferred)

Place in a fridge for at least 30 mins.

- 3. Bake in a hot oven 190°C for 15/20 mins. until the pastry is pale gold in colour. Remove from oven & leave to cool.
- 4. Meanwhile make the filling. Put the rhubarb, orange rind, juice & sugar in a pan, cover with lid. Cook gently until the rhubarb is just tender but NOT mushy.
- 5. Cool, then spoon the rhubarb onto the base using a slotted spoon so that most of the juice is left in the saucepan.
- 6. For the topping whisk the egg whites, gradually adding the caster sugar until the meringue is stiff. Spoon the meringue over the rhubarb, covering it entirely.
- 7. Bake in a cool oven 130 $^{\circ}C$ for approx 20 mins. until the meringue is golden. Serve warm or cold with cream.
